



A Neoclassical chalcedony intaglio set in a 22k gold ring. The Conquest of Love.

Intaglio 16 × 19 mm

Gold 22 k – Ring size US 8¼ (UK Q / EU 57½) – 7.92 g

Intaglio : Late 18th - early 19th century

The oval chalcedony, milky and translucent, engraved with a winged, nude Cupid standing in a biga at full gallop — the goad in one hand, the reins in the other, the flying gallop above clouds; open gold bezel.

The subject is the Love-chase / the Love conquest: Cupid as charioteer of the heart, racing headlong across the heavens in pursuit — Love that gives chase, seizes and carries off, the metaphor of desire that drives the human heart.

The motif of Cupid driving a chariot is a favourite of ancient glyptic and, through the Grand Tour taste for engraved gems, among the most reproduced subjects of the Neoclassical revival.
